December branch meeting

atthew opened the meeting with some updates on what the executive have been doing in terms of campaign planning. He outlined how we plan to engage more with social media and how members can help with this.

We are also going to review our use of WhatsApp so we can communicate "calls to action" with members who are happy to be included. The existing WhatsApp groups set up for other purposes (e.g. May election campaign, Liverpool conference etc) will be disbanded, so if you need to communicate with us and don't want to use WhatsApp, please contact us by email.

Matthew split his presentation into looking back and looking forward, providing a summary of all we have done this year and where we plan to go next. Sue distributed certificates to those present who participated in the Bellboat Regatta and still has some for Simon, Anne, Helen and Jon.

Brian outlined the strategy that he and Neal have identified to engage people to apply for voter registration and Matthew outlined the electoral calculus predictions as of 13 December for the upcoming general election. Although the seat (Droitwich and Evesham) is predicted to be a Tory hold, Nigel Huddleston's predicted vote share has dropped from 66.7% to 38.9% (which equates to a majority of 5359 votes) so... you never know!

The December branch meeting was planned largely to be a social event with a quiz. At the start of the year, we sought ideas from members for getting the branch more visible and quizzing was a popular response which has been taken up through holding our own quiz nights and participating in local quizzes as an ELP team. So after a break to exchange library books and refill glasses, the quiz commenced.

The competition between the top three teams was fierce and close, but good spirits prevailed and the most challenging question (How many votes did Labour win in the 2019 election?) with a cash prize was won by the CLP chair Alex Knudsen. Well done, Alex!

Thanks as ever are extended to the Taskers for compiling the quiz, to David for acting as quiz host and Mary for producing stupendous hampers for the bumper raffle. The raffle raised £156 for our branch funds, so thank you to everyone who bought tickets. Thanks too to Peter (as ever) for transporting the library and distributing materials for the reading group .

The meeting was well attended and it was good to welcome members from Droitwich branch, along with some new faces and left-leaning friends. We hope that they enjoyed the evening and will consider supporting us again in future.

Applications are now open for anyone wishing to be the next Parliamentary candidate for our constituency of Droitwich & Evesham. Anyone wishing to apply must have been both a Labour Party member for a continuous period of twelve months and also a member of a trade union.

Those who are interested in submitting an application have until 12 noon Wednesday 10 January to do so.

Since its inception, Droitwich & Evesham (formerly Mid Worcestershire) has always been a Tory 'safe seat'.

- Based on the current polling, seen below, we could make it a much closer run thing at the next General Election
- The constituency has seen significant demographic shift since 2019 due to new housing influx — this could impact results
- The CLP has an active programme to address voter registration amongst young people and renters, the most likely groups to impact a Labour result

COP28: Will Jarvis


The COP28 conference kicked off with leaked documents from the UAE, using this opportunity to sign trade agreements with other countries to trade their oil. This is not what people would expect from the hosts of the biggest climate talks of the year. Also, the fact that the host of COP28 being the seventh most oil-producing country leading the talks to save our planet just sounds completely mad. Furthermore, the president of this year's COP is Sultan al-Jaber, who is also the CEO of Abu Dhabi's national oil company. Despite that, there were 2,456 delegates from the oil and gas sector attending COP, along with 475 delegates from the carbon capture and storage industry. This shows that oil CEOs are truly in charge of COP.

At least the UK was well represented this year, with Rishi Sunak and King Charles giving speeches to world leaders and business leaders. With Rishi Sunak saying that we must fight climate change and keep 1.5° alive. However, what he tells us at home is that we must invest in new oil fields in the North Sea and that we need to delay the ban on new petrol and diesel cars. At least King Charles gave a good speech saying, "The Earth does not belong to us, we belong to the Earth." We know that Charles has been fighting for a better environment for years and what he says there is true. He represented our interests much better than our unelected prime minster.

Branch WhatsApp community

We have decided to create a new WhatsApp community for our branch. This will allow us to keep member and supporters updated about events and activities much faster than by traditional email methods. This WhatsApp community is called "Evesham, Labour Party Action!" and it appears in WhatsApp just like any other group or community. The difference is that it is just one-way communication, so we can broadcast what is happening in the branch.

Brian is already using it to notify everyone about new social media posts which he is encouraging us all to like and share (see below). Doing this has a huge impact on our engagement with the public because it is only the most liked and shared posts that make it to the top of people's Facebook feeds. We think this is a powerful tool for driving out our message in the run-up to an election.
