Hampton ward meeting — a report

istrict councillor candidates Heather Kelleher and Brian Gregory recently attended a meeting organised by Hampton ward residents, with the purpose of gaining a greater understanding of local issues as well as raising visibility of Labour party participation.

Held at the Hampton Farm Shop, around a dozen local residents were joined by Peter Griffiths, Worcestershire County Council Councillor and Evesham North District Councillor, as well as Barry Barnes, Divisional Highways Manager. Residents living close to Pershore Road raised frustrations and concern at repeated road maintenance disruption by telephone, electricity and gas companies, including the latest gas pipe works that are due to complete on 10th March 2023.

Following two hours of often heated discussion, one of the main takeaways was that Councillor powers are limited in ensuring that service maintenance is co-ordinated. Instead, close and strong oversight of planned work, and work being undertaken, will be needed to reduce disruption.

It is understood that the Tories intend to campaign on the need for house builders to include adequate infrastructure. But what became clear is the level to which companies quite literally walk away having failed to do so and how limited the Council's powers are to hold them to account.

Peter Griffiths provided several credible anecdotes about this — before he discovered that Heather and Brian represent Labour!

Issues around traffic management systems such as incorrect phasing of lights were also raised as problematic. However, here the District Council do have some power, as fixed-penalty notices can be issued when this occurs.

People in Hampton were also angered that many had not received the required letters warning them in advance of planned works, and similarly about newly-built roads on the estate not being developed to a standard where the Highways Agency will adopt them. Until adoption, these roads remain the responsibility of the residents.

On a final and positive note, the presence of Labour candidates at the meeting appeared to be welcomed and they received a mostly positive response when asked what party they were standing for. Some even noted their names and gave a commitment to vote for them!
