#ShePaddles is a British Canoeing initiative which aims to increase the number of women and girls involved in the paddling community.

March Branch meeting

he meeting opened with an update on membership and the welcome news that all our candidates for the May election have now been approved and are preparing to campaign.

As the branch meeting was held on Wednesday 8th March, it provided a further opportunity to celebrate International Women's Day. The theme for 2023 is Embrace Equity. We remembered some of the pioneering women in the Labour movement who led the way to improving women's lives in the past, including Barbara Castle (Equal Pay Act), Jennie Lee (Open University), Mo Mowlem (Good Friday Agreement), Tessa Jowell (Sure Start) and Betty Boothroyd (first Woman Speaker of the House of Commons), as well as Diane Abbott (first black woman MP and longest-serving black MP).

We then praised our women Trades Union leaders – Christina McAnea (Unison), Sharon Graham (Unite), Pat Cullen (RCN), Jo Grady (UCU) and Mary Bousted (NEU) – who continue to the fight for better pay and conditions for their members. Finally, we considered the women in the current shadow cabinet who are working to develop policy as the Labour Party prepares to form the next government after the General Election.

The second part of the meeting focused on working in small groups to review the initial draft of the campaign leaflet. The design has been influenced by the candidates' participation in the

Labour Party Project Victory webinars and the advice these provided. The work done by the candidates was highly valued and the suggestions for adaptions were largely centred on vocabulary and readability. The campaign group have taken the feedback forward and will embrace this as they review and adapt the campaign materials.

Mary Tasker had put together a magnificent chocolate hamper for the raffle and members brought donations of Easter Eggs to kick off our collection for Caring Hands. Thanks again are extended to Mary, Wendy Logan and Patrick for selling tickets . The fundraising enabled us to add £103 to our funds. As always, we thank members for their generosity.

Better Buses

On 2nd March Sue Wood-Griffiths, Lee and Lorraine Middleburgh and Brian Chilver attended a meeting organised by the Town Council called 'Bus Service Improvement'. Held at the Town Hall, eleven local residents were joined by the Chair of the meeting, a town councillor (who failed to introduce herself) and Worcestershire County Council Councillor Mike Rouse, Cabinet member for Highways and Transport. The meeting was poorly advertised and there was an irony in the timing being outside the hours that buses run into the town. The audience were therefore predominantly car users.

Mr Rouse started by being critical of the legislation (Bus Services Act, 2017) that governs bus services. He talked about the County Council's plans and what they were doing elsewhere in the county.

It was very evident that Evesham district is not a priority. He said that since the pandemic, bus use and demand had dropped, with lightweight reasoning about more online shopping and Covid anxiety. Then he presented their concept of demand-led services and designing a common livery for the buses! There was some disquiet from the audience when the penny dropped that if they say there is no demand locally, nothing will be done.

When asked whose responsibility it was to label bus stops, and post timetables and fares, he responded it was the joint responsibility of the service providers and the County Council and that some plans were in hand. It is really not good enough for this information to not be easily available to people who want to use buses and plan journeys. The Council does not acknowledge that the people who are most reliant on the buses are the elderly, the young, the poorest in the community and those with language and learning difficulties, and that some of these groups are

likely to be those who have least proficiency with accessing information online.

We left the meeting feeling angry that these meetings are not well publicised, and our frustration was compounded by there being nothing about improving things here and now. It was all '40 hospitals' down the line.

Quiz

On 25th February, Team *Steir Karmer*, emboldened by their win at The Labour Party quiz, entered the Cornmill Yard quiz and ran a close second. During the interval the team were tasked to make a model of the team that included all the members and the team's name! Our creativity knows no bounds and if this task been a point scorer a victory would have been ours!



Gazebo

On 25th February we took the gazebo to Bretforton and placed it in the 'newer' part of the village on Coldicotts Lane just opposite the cricket club.

Having found a nice spot near the bus stop we were quickly impressed by the number of encouraging toots and waves we received.

David and Mary Tasker had brought Welsh cakes to keep us going and Angela brought her dog.

We got a few opportunities to speak to residents and received the usual encouragement, including a lengthy discussion with a woman and child who talked in depth about the bus services and the impossibility of ever owning her own home. We also enjoyed a flying visit from Joan who set a record for 'gazebo tooting'. All in all, we were pleased with the response. After packing up, we did a 'recce' around the older part of the village to check out whether we could squeeze the gazebo

in near The Fleece for a future date and met a few more supportive residents.

On the 11th March we took the gazebo to the top of Greenhill. Another spot with limited footfall — but a huge opportunity to advertise to a lot of cars that Labour is active. We resorted to the now trusty whiteboards with appeals for 'Hoot for change' and 'You'll need Voter ID'. The overall response was amazing, with hardly any drivers giving us a thumbs-down or other similar hand gestures.

There were a fair few dog walkers out and one in particular stopped for a long chat explaining how he had just recently re-joined a Union out of frustration with his employer's dismissive stance on worker's rights and opinions. This, it transpired, was a well known 'Big-Corp' in Cheltenham, and he explained that they had now reached the required Union membership threshold for the employer to recognise them!

We had gone out clad in multiple insulating layers, but were surprised as the morning warmed up. Just before packing up we heard an unusual tooting from a passing bicycle, only to discover that Neal Cartwright had come to offer his support.
