June Branch meeting

hank you to Heather Kelleher for arranging for Mick Hurst to come and speak to the meeting. Mick is the mastermind of the now annual Battle of Evesham re-enactment and the medieval banquet and markets.

Mick is a medieval history enthusiast who detailed the development of the Battle of Evesham events which he has introduced to celebrate the town historical significance. He came with visual aids and bloodthirsty descriptions of how they were used. Members enjoyed examining the swords and helmet and imagined wearing nine-stone weight of battle regalia. He also shared how the events have grown and his estimates of how much footfall and expenditure is brought to the local economy.

His ambitions for the town have expanded from hosting the reenactment and medieval fayres to rewilding the original battle site and creating a multi-purpose Visitors' Centre which could host up to 200 guests. Mick's tenacity in potentially securing a lease on the land and

sharing his plans with those most likely to object is impressive, and we look forward to seeing these materialise.

In the second half of the meeting Matthew opened with a tribute to our friend Green Councillor Ed Cohen who died on 6th June. Ed was very generous in advising the executive on campaigning for the district and town council elections and we shall miss his wise counsel.

Members agreed to nominate Matthew, Mary Tasker and Heather as delegates to the annual conference and Mary Campbell as a delegate to the Women's Conference. At the end of the meeting the calendar of forthcoming events was shared. At the next meeting we will welcome Louise Bugg from Avonvale River Action who will share the work the group are doing to monitor the river water. In preparation for this Helen has led the Big Paddle Clean up and Brian and Neal have attended a meeting (more of which later) and we agreed that this will be the likely focus of our campaigning over the summer.

We welcomed one new supporter, David, who has been drawn back to the group and we hope that he will feel inspired to join us. At the end of the evening Mary Tasker ran the monthly raffle with the star prize coming from the medieval market. The raffle raised £50 for our funds.

Avonvale River Action Group

t the end of May, Brian Gregory and Neal Cartwright attended the most recent meeting held by the newly-titled Avonvale River Action group.

The purpose of this local volunteer group is to support the efforts of the Water Quality Monitoring Network (WQMN) which aims to harness the power of angling clubs, via The Angling Trust, and other volunteer groups to establish a solid foundation of data relating to water quality across England. This data, once aggregated, will be used to better understand the factors affecting water quality, aid in the development of effective solutions, improve water quality and provide the Angling Trust with evidence to support its campaign.

Under this initiative, volunteer groups are required to conduct regular monitoring activities on rivers across England and Wales and, with the support of an Angling Trust Coordinator, will recruit and organise teams of local monitors who will be allocated monitoring sites — hence the formation of the *Avonvale River Action* group. Monitors will gather a range of data for each site on a regular and consistent basis to measure, for example, phosphates, pH, nitrates, electrical conductivity, ammonia and temperature.

The data gathered is not designed to replace the statutory monitoring undertaken by the Environment Agency or water companies or to directly challenge it. Unfortunately, statutory monitoring is extremely limited meaning that there are significant gaps in the understanding of water quality. The WQMN data will help to fill these gaps and the data captured will be used by the local networks and other organisations to help inform the wider understanding of water quality.

The criticality of this work is underlined in this recent Worcester News article:

worcesternews.co.uk/news/23558802. environment-agency-say-chemicals-avon-temerivers/ which highlights an Environment Agency report that the River Avon at Lower Evesham is among the worst affected locations in the country with five 'forever' chemicals found in the river. 'Forever' chemicals are so named because they never break down in the environment.

Following the meeting, Brian and Neal have both signed up to undertake water sampling. This will require a monthly visit to a designated location on the Avon to collect samples and take measurements. Brian has also reached out to Evesham Town Council will a view to securing funds for the purchase of an additional monitoring kit, cost approximately £130.

Louise Bugg, who spearheads the *Avonvale River Action* group, has kindly agreed to attend the Labour branch meeting being held on 12 July 2023 to present the activities and findings of the group. Big Paddle Clean-Up

embers joined with Anti-Litter Evesham and local paddlers to clean up a stretch of the River Avon as part of this year's national Big Paddle Clean-Up.

Litter pickers walked and paddled from Crown Meadow, Evesham and headed along the Avon to Hampton Ferry, collecting over fifteen bags of litter along the way as part of British Canoeing's Big Paddle Clean-Up, a fortnight of action to protect the places we love to paddle and walk from plastic pollution.



In a variety of craft including stand-up paddleboards and kayaks, the aim for those on the water was to remove as much litter as they could, before it travelled downstream and out towards the coast.

The volunteers removed sacks full of plastic pollution, with the usual suspects including plastic water bottles, drinks cans and fast-food packaging, along with some rather unusual items including part of a car roof rack and a VW car wheel.

British Canoeing launched its Access and Environment Charter, Clear Access, Clear Waters, in 2018 championing the case for fair shared sustainable open access to inland waterways. As part of the Clear Access, Clear Waters campaign, British Canoeing is pledging to continue to protect and improve the health of our rivers, addressing plastic in our waterways and highlighting the positive impact accessing our waterways can have for the environment.

Badsey Parish Councillor: Mary Campbell

The main subject on everyone's mind is the number of new housing applications for larger builds. An application for 90 houses adjacent to the Blackminster turn is causing great concern. Badsey has had too many applications approved for unimaginative red brick estate homes. This leads me to wonder if the villages should be developing a joint forum to discuss plans for new housing?

Offenham Parish Councillor: Matthew Rea

Having now attended my second parish council meeting I must say I am beginning to feel more at home and can see a way to be effective. We have some very experienced council members who take a balanced but tough line on planning and it is clear that all issues raised by parishioners are on someone's agenda and getting focus. I'm becoming more familiar with the job and the people I am working with and they are supportive. Key issues remain as speeding and planning. It seems almost everyone with a sizeable back garden or a bit of agricultural land fancies becoming a property developer and the village is resolute that expansion will be supported but only in a planned and contained way.

As for speeding, we have seen yet another near-fatal accident at Offenham Cross and residents feelings on this are running high. More meetings with police and highways are planned. I have joined Community Speed Watch as a volunteer and am now awaiting my training, so watch out if you are driving out to Offenham!

Last week was Offenham Wake Week which the parish council used to meet residents, discuss our plans and collect feedback. I particularly enjoyed our last council meeting when the call went out for a gazebo for the council stand at Wake Week — you can imagine how tempted I was to offer the Labour Gazebo!

Wychavon District Councillor: Mary Tasker

My first month as councillor has been really busy. I have been placed on the planning committee and undertaken planning training, so I now have an overview of housing and the policies surrounding this.



We thought it would be nice to share Helen Russell's continued sporting success with you. May was packed with races and saw Helen win the European Middle Distance Quadrathlon Championships (1500 m river swim, 7 km kayak, 30 km bike and 10 km run) held in Brigg, Lincs. This win adds to Helen's collection of international quadrathlon titles, having won her age group in the World Middle Distance Championships in 2019 and the World Sprint Championships in 2018. Helen has also secured a place on the podium in this year's GB SUP (Stand Up Paddleboarding) National Distance Race Series after finishing 2nd and 1st in the first two races of the season. The Series rewards consistency through the season, with competitors' two top scores from three series
